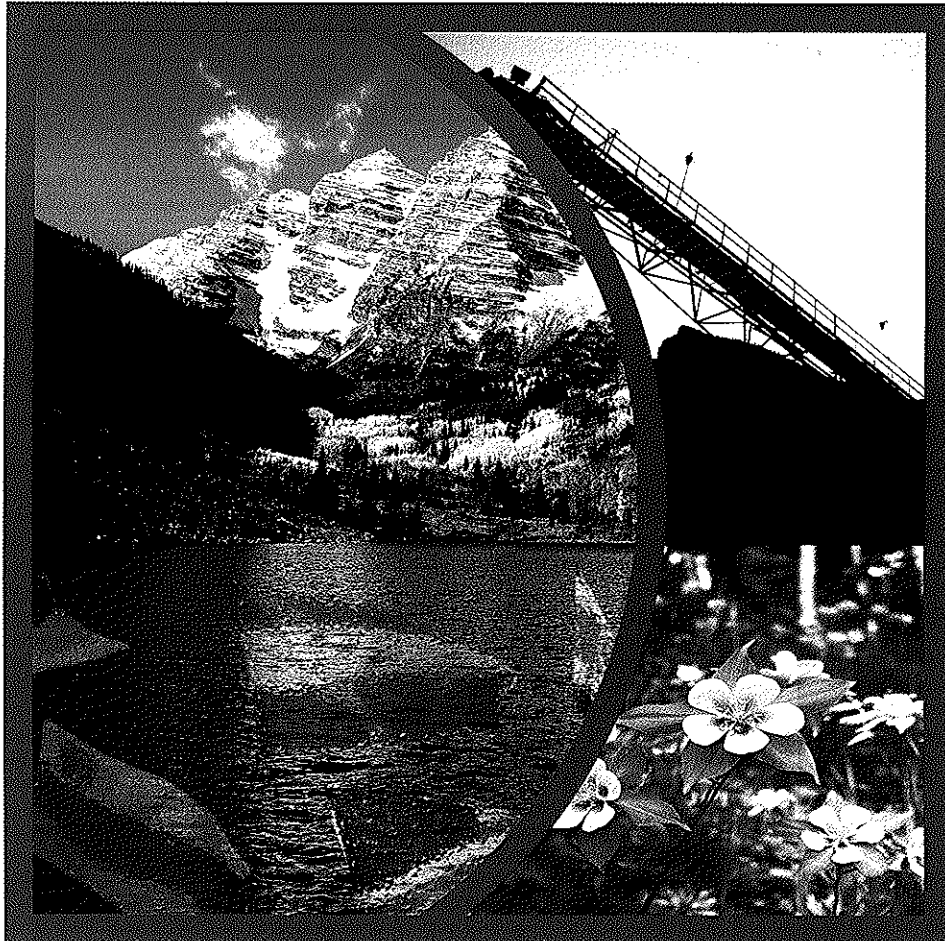

Director's Message



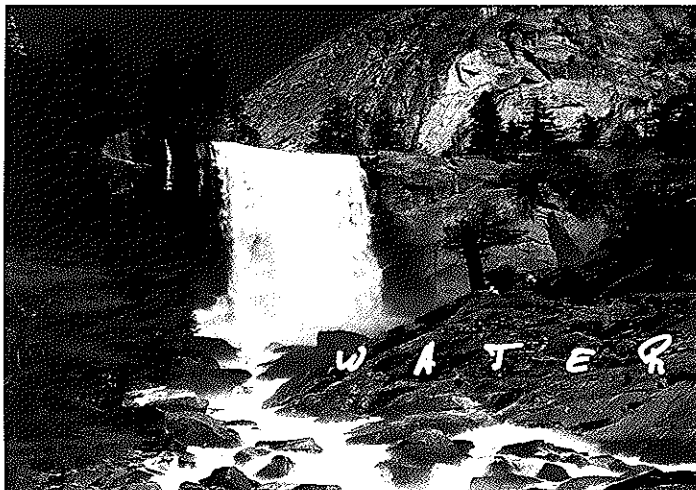

THE DENVER TRADITION

Many environmental and natural resources professionals worldwide consider Denver the North American hub of international environmental and natural resources advisory services. Denver has one of the world's largest concentrations of environmental and natural resources consultancy services and government agencies (Environmental Protection Agency, Forest Service, Fish and Wildlife Service, US Geological Survey, National Parks Service, National Renewable Energy Lab). In addition, globally recognized natural resource companies like AMOCO, AngloGold, ASARCO, Conoco Phillips, Gold Fields, Newcrest Resources, Newmont, Royal Gold, Schlumberger, Western Mining, and Texaco are located in the Denver area. Fittingly, the University of Denver's Environmental and Natural Resources Law program, with a history dating back to the 1800s, is one of the world's academic leaders in the environmental and natural resources field.



ADVANCED STUDY PROGRAMS

Master of Laws (LLM) in Environmental and Natural Resources Law and Policy

Open to applicants who have completed a JD or foreign equivalent degree. The LLM program develops your expertise for specialization in a global environmental and/or natural resources law career.

Master of Resources Law Studies (MRLS)

Open to applicants with a non-law degree. For professionals who want to broaden their understanding of environmental/natural resources law.

Certificate of Studies (CS) in Environmental and Natural Resources Law

A non-degree program for professionals who wish to obtain specialization skills in environmental/natural resources law but are unable to devote a full year to masters degree study. Open to applicants with a JD or foreign equivalent, or another acceptable non-law university degree.

Certificate in Sustainable Development of Natural Resources

A non-degree program open to professionals, lawyers or non-lawyers, who wish to select courses relating to the Sustainable Development of Natural Resources. This is a four-course series of one-week classes taught during interterm sessions. For more information visit <http://www.law.du.edu/index.php/SNRDS>

Full-time students in the program can expect to complete the LLM or MRLS in two semesters. The CS may be completed in one semester. Part-time students have up to three years to complete their masters level program. All programs are based on earning a minimum number of semester credit hours (LLM/MRLS-24 hrs. CS-12hrs).

THE CURRICULUM

A student's course of study may be customized, depending upon his or her goal to work internationally, within the United States, or both. The Sturm College of Law offers a wide variety of courses, divided between international and domestic issues. Courses include subjects in environmental, natural resources, and energy law as well as related foundation courses in public and private law. MRLS and LLM degree students may customize their degree by selecting any approved courses.

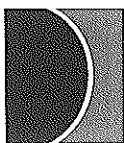
Applications are accepted year round. Our semesters commence in August and January, so you may begin your studies in either semester.

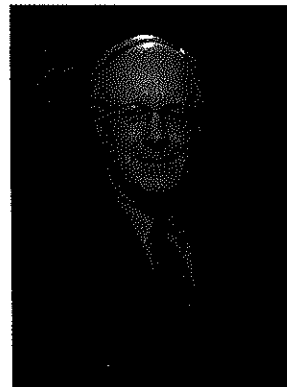


Faculty

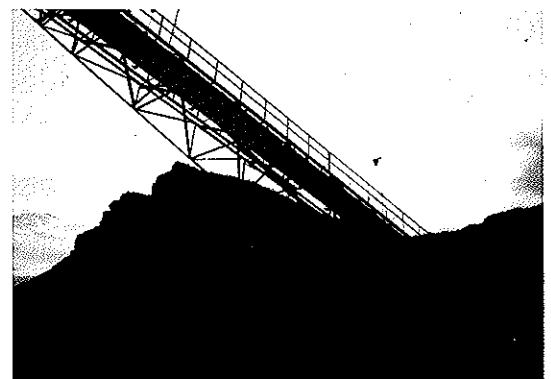

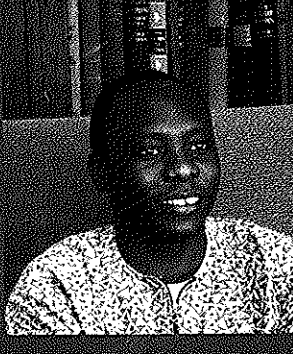
