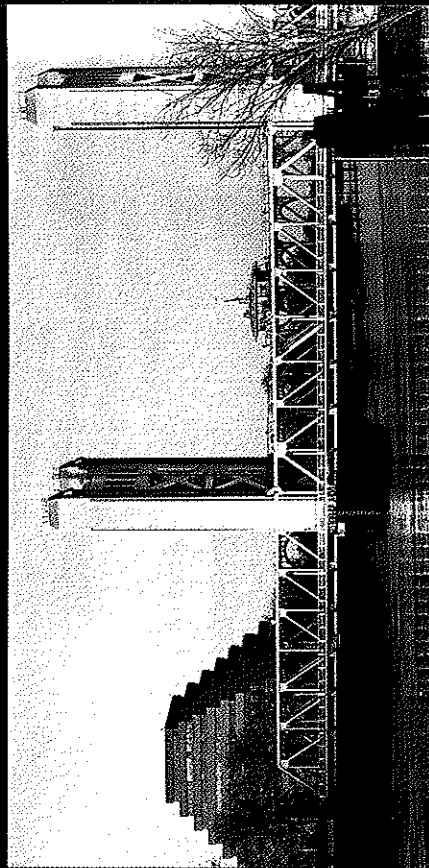

This LL.M. program is the first-ever collaboration of its kind between an American university and a European Union university. University of the Pacific McGeorge School of Law and the University of Salzburg have created an integrated program designed to prepare both civil law and common law lawyers for the rigors of international business practice.

LL.M. candidates may begin the program with the fall semester (mid-September to mid-December) at the University of Salzburg in Austria or the spring semester (mid-January to mid-May) at Pacific McGeorge in Sacramento, California. The required curriculum has been designed to be complementary and students will be advised on an individual basis to select elective offerings to maximize the benefits of the curriculum and avoid duplication and overlap. All required courses and all principal elective courses in both Salzburg and Sacramento will be taught in English.

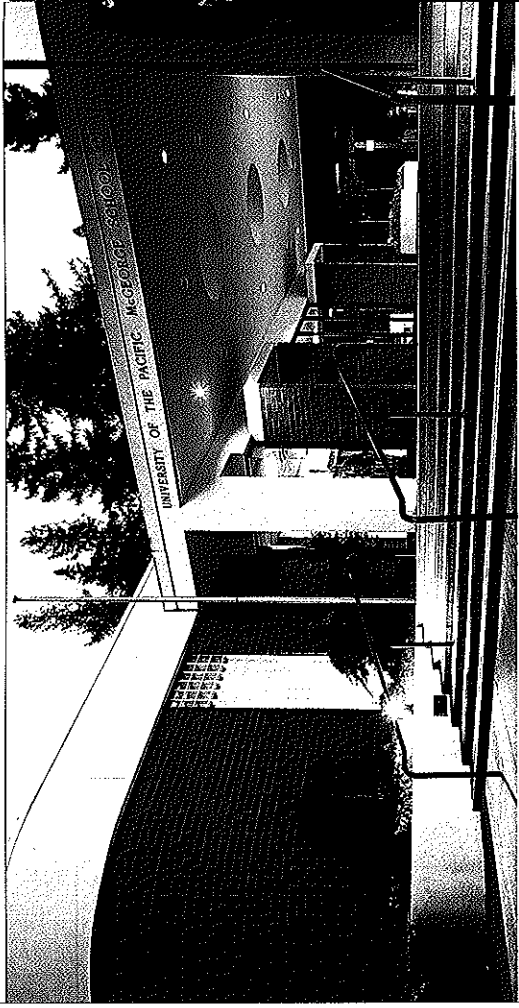
During the spring semester, LL.M. candidates have the option of either studying on the Pacific McGeorge campus for the entire semester and completing the required number of credits; or they may elect to take a special pre-internship curriculum for the first six weeks of the semester, followed by a ten- to twelve-week internship in an international law firm. The internship may be in the United States or in one of nearly forty other countries in Europe, Asia and Latin America.

The degree – LL.M. in Transnational Business Practice – will be awarded jointly by Pacific McGeorge, which is fully accredited by the American Bar Association (ABA) and by the University of Salzburg.

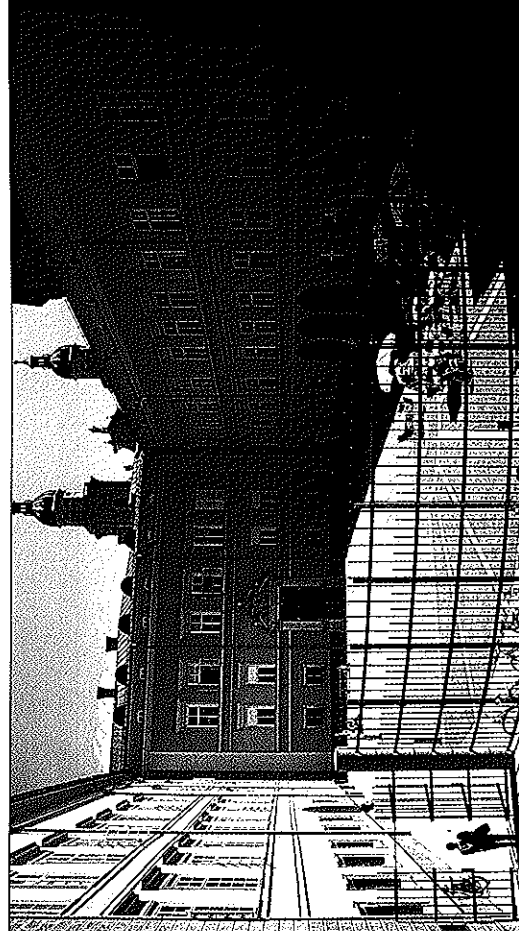


The Universities



Pacific McGeorge School of Law

The University of the Pacific was established in 1851 as the first chartered private institution of higher learning in California. Long recognized as an innovator in private education, the school offers undergraduate, graduate and professional education through one school on three campuses. McGeorge School of Law, founded in Sacramento in 1924, joined the University in 1966. Pacific McGeorge is recognized as one of the top teaching law faculties in the United States: the quality of its teaching has been ranked in the top 10 percent of all American law schools, and its international law program has been ranked among the top twenty in the United States.



University of Salzburg Law Faculty

The University of Salzburg is counted among the prestigious institutions of legal education in Europe. Graduates appreciate not only excellent education but also the “family-like” atmosphere as a result of small class-size and individual attention. Furthermore they enjoy the unique atmosphere of the city of Salzburg, a World Cultural Heritage City proclaimed by UNESCO in 1997. Founded in 1622, the University of Salzburg Faculty of Law is situated in the heart of the Old City of Salzburg. Classes are held at a 16th century Baroque-style Palace surrounded by piazzas, parks and fountains.

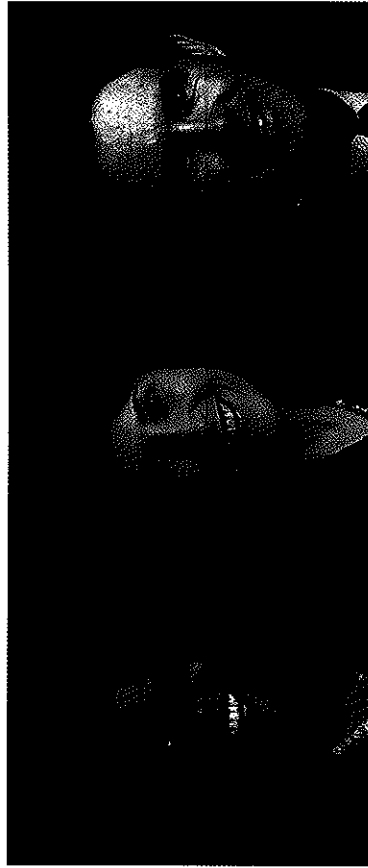

Each non-internship candidate is required to take either Advanced International Business Transactions (3 units) or Transnational Litigation (3 units). Many students choose to take both. All LL.M. candidates who received their law training outside the United States are also required to take Legal Process-LL.M. (3 units)

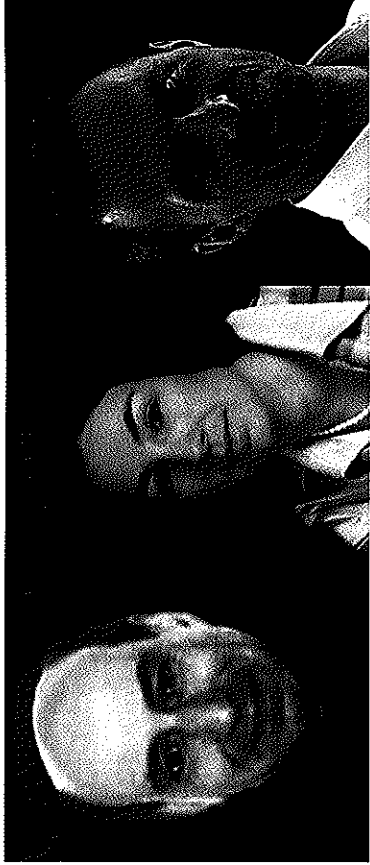
LL.M. candidates choosing the internship option will take a required curriculum for the first six weeks of the spring semester, followed by a ten- to twelve-week internship.

Required Pre-Internship courses:

Comparative Competition Law (1 unit)
Comparative Intellectual Property Law (1 unit)
International Insolvency (1 unit)
Transnational Litigation (1 unit)
Advanced International Business Transactions (1 unit)
Documentary Sales Transactions (1 unit)

Credit will be given for courses not listed above upon showing that they will better contribute to the candidates personal career goals. Non-American law graduates wishing to qualify to sit for the New York Bar examination must earn a minimum of twenty semester units from an American law school. Credits earned at the University of Salzburg will not be counted towards this requirement.

Salzburg Courses, (Fall Semester)

University of Salzburg (each year's course offerings are subject to change)

While studying in Salzburg, students may take up to six courses, choosing from among the European Law Cluster and from among the Business Law Cluster. Each course is typically worth two units of credit.

EUROPEAN LAW CLUSTER

European Law – Basic Concepts of European Law

Deals with the institutions, source of law, legal protection and the relationship between EU law and national law.

European Law – Common Market Law

Provides in-depth coverage of the rules governing free movement of goods, persons, services and capital within the European Union.

European Law – EC Competition Law

Focuses on the legal system of Articles 81 and 82 of EC Treaty as well as the merger control system. Includes laws against agreements restricting competition and prohibitions on abuses of dominant position.

BUSINESS LAW CLUSTER

International Sales Transactions

Focuses on international capital market; difficulties faced in dealing with several national and international regulatory bodies designed to control or encourage economic development, protect investors and consumers, and allocate foreign exchange.

International Mergers and Acquisitions

Provides an introduction to the principal legal issues in connection with cross-border corporate M&A transactions and related financing aspects.

International Commercial Arbitration

Deals e.g. with commercial arbitration as used in international business transactions, advantages and disadvantages of arbitration, availability of arbitration; drafting of arbitration clauses; arbitration proceedings.

International Trade Law

The course focuses on the law of the WTO and the role of the EU in the WTO.

Drafting International Contracts

Deals with payment and payment securities in foreign trade, handling of international payment transactions, short-medium-longterm export credits with collateral securities and bank guarantees in foreign trade.

Application Procedures

LL.M. Program

The LL.M. in Transnational Business Practice may be earned by completing twelve units of semester credit during the fall semester at the University of Salzburg and twelve units of semester credit during the spring semester at University of the Pacific McGeorge School of Law.

LL.M. with Internship Program

A candidate for the LL.M. in Transnational Business Practice has the option to participate in an Internship. This 10 to 12 week placement in a law firm, corporate legal department or international organization in any one of many countries located around the world distinguishes this track of the LL.M. in Transnational Business Practice from other LL.M. programs. Interns are expected to be fully integrated into the daily work of the host firm. The internship must be completed in a country that is foreign to the candidate's own country of law study. Internship placements commence only after the candidate has enrolled in the fall semester at either the University of Salzburg or Pacific

McGeorge. First the candidates take a special six-week course of pre-internship seminars in residence on the Sacramento campus and they then start their 10 to 12 week internship.

Application Procedure

Application to the collaborative LL.M. in Transnational Business Practice program may be completed and submitted on-line at www.mcgeorge.edu/salzburgLLM.

Applicants for admission to the LL.M. Program must present evidence of (1) graduation from a school of law approved by the American Bar Association or an officially approved law school in the European Union; or (2) admission to the bar of a state in the United States or a member State of the European Union; or (3) graduation from a faculty of law outside the U.S. and the EU whose educational authority has authorized that faculty to issue degrees in law.
